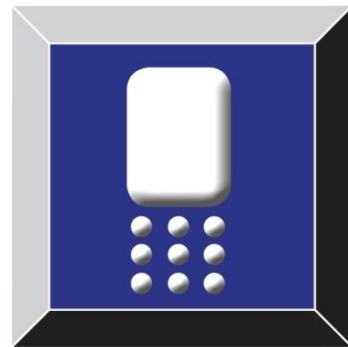

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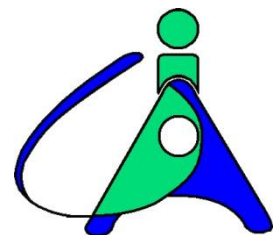

Beyond outsourcing

The multi-sourcing trend is gaining momentum internationally, but in the Middle East and Africa over 80% of outsourcing deals are still done with single service providers. The downside of the multi-sourcing model is a more fragmented IT outsourcing. Companies use two or three service providers that are expected to provide a catalogue of services, with different terms and service level agreements applying to each one. These services would typically be charged for on a per use basis, or a fixed price with variable costs for additional components. Cloud or on-line service providers operate on a bigger scale with a broader customer base, so offer better price models and economies, but generally don't contract for specific service level agreements. Application hosting services can sometimes reduce software licencing costs, allowing service providers to charge their customers on a per use basis. As IT usage models change and the trend towards software hosting and software as a service gathers momentum, all software suppliers will be forced to move in this direction.
